Thank you for your timely reply to this morning's email. I would like to respond to a few of the points you have made in your letter.

Firstly I was unaware of the handbill campaign until I received a copy of the affidavit filed by Ms. Neale.

I take exception to your presenting before Justice Brenner that I had been "duly served". I feel this is a misrepresentation. I was aware of the email but I understand this does not constitute service.

With regard to the previous Quantum media article, facts are just that, facts. I was in Justice Loo's court room and heard her pronouncements. The same can be said of what transpired in Justice Morrison's court room. I did go to Bulgaria and met with Mr. Braich's management team and view the facility

It is not is my nature to attack the professionalism, integrity competence of anyone. I will say again that I have not been defamatory or disparaging in the past nor do I intend to be in the future. I maintain however, that I can be objective about the performance of someone in their duties and not be disparaging or defamatory. We still have free speech in Canada.

I have asked Mr. Rusko on 2 occasions to provide instruction on how the creditors can facilitate a change of the trustee. He has not responded. I intend to as ask again. I plan to copy this letter to the Superintendent of Bankruptcy to record the fact I have made these requests. One would think he would like nothing better than to be rid of this file. There have been other questions which have also gone unanswered.

I was unaware that my affidavit is on the Quantum website. I did not provide Quantum with a copy and will look into the matter further.

Canada is one of the few places left in the world where due process still has meaning. I take pride in being Canadian and it saddens me to think that the final chapter of this unfortunate series of events will be played out in an American court room. I wish it could have ended differently.
